you" to them for their diligent work on your behalf. The meeting was held at the Travelodge, as no space was available at the STF building because of the renovations.

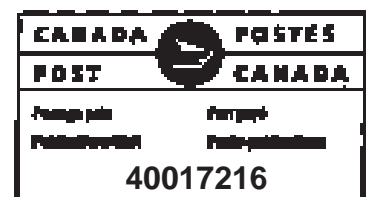

We will have three areas - one of which is an office and the other two are open areas. There is the possibility of some further renovations to make these open areas more convenient. The Budget and Finance Committee reviewed the financial statements to date, and reported that we are well within budget. The Annual General Meeting was over budget, but this was compensated by the corporate donations that were received. The Committee approved the annual expense allowance for the Executive Secretary, Outreach Editor, *Outreach* Co-ordinator, Benefits Committee Chair and our Auditor. An ad hoc payment to

ACER/CART was approved in order that that organization could maintain an accumulated surplus. Most member organizations pay a flat fee of \$300. Our current budget will allow for this payment. Our membership is now over 6100. This will increase as memberships are sent in for those members who pay to the local Chapter or are non-Chapter members. Our membership year is from July 1 to June 30, and I encourage Chapters to make an effort to collect these fees before the end of June.

Chapter visits have already started. I visited with the Nipawin Chapter on September 5 at the beautiful Pasqua Hills Regional Park. It was a delightful evening, and I welcomed the opportunity to renew friendships. A number of Chapters have issued invitations for the next few months and a number for 2003. To me, visits to Chapters are what make the position of president so enjoyable. Chapters are a vital part of our organization, and I look forward to hearing your thoughts. We need your input.

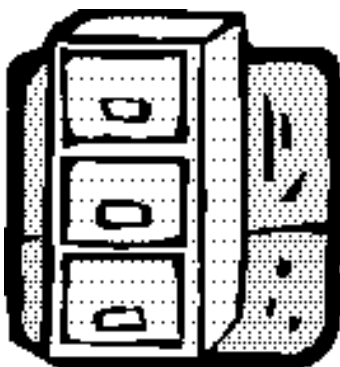

Project North Success

ERNIE EPP--STS SASKATOON COORDINATOR OF THE NORTHERN TEACHER-ASSOCIATE PROGRAM

The first year of placing retired Saskatchewan teachers as Teacher Associates in remote northern Saskatchewan schools ended successfully. And, the program is already well underway this year.

The Superannuated Teachers of Saskatchewan under the leadership of the Saskatoon Branch, initiated this program under the auspices of the Northern Lights School Division #113(NLSD) in the fall of 2001. At this time 5 superannuated teachers were matched with 8 northern schools to spend up to 3 weeks of the school year working with teachers in these schools. Only remote and isolated schools are considered for this program. Recruiting and retaining teachers for these schools is generally very difficult. It was the belief of retired teachers taking leadership in this venture that providing mentor-like help for full-time teachers in these schools would be helpful. The

Northern Lights School Division was in full agreement and the trial year is now history. NLSD has appointed one of its consultants Mr. Joe Bergerman as the Division's liaison to this program. This appointment will improve some of the communication and scheduling difficulties experienced last year.

Schools served in this manner were: Timber Bay, Weyakwin, Cole Bay, Brabant, Jans Bay, St. George's Hill, Michel Village, and Dore Lake. An evaluation of this program was undertaken by NLSD at the end of the year. Teachers helped in this manner reported much satisfaction with the retired teachers that came to their schools. The retired teachers involved also reported much satisfaction over this opportunity. They indicated that they learned so much about Northern Saskatchewan, and have come to appreciate the culture and educational challenges that face this part of our province. Also, most are more than willing to go back.

More than 20 retired teachers applied

to join this program for only 8 to 10 spots available. NLSD has again budgetted for the following superannuates to serve in the schools noted above for this year: Ernie Epp (Saskatoon), Wes Green (Meadow Lake), Faye Kunkel (Saskatoon), Kathy Lindgren (Saskatoon), Margaret Martin (Saskatoon), Lynda McLean-Woodward (Saskatoon), Gordon Millham (Saskatoon), Theresa Morin (Saskatoon).

Committee Reports

Retirement Lifestyle Planning

At the committee meeting on September 10/02 the members first looked at methods of contacting teacher groups to let them know about the Lifestyle seminars available and to see if they are interested. Several methods were mentioned and will be pursued.

We are planning a Training Session for new presenters to acquaint them with the program and prepare them to help put on the seminars. We still need a few people who are interested and interesting, who are effective presenters and enjoy talking to groups. Know anyone?

We hope to be able to arrange the Training Session for November 5, but the details have not been finalized.

McDowell Foundation Report

The Board of the McDowell Foundation met on Saturday, June 15/02. The Foundation's endowment fund has grown to more than \$1.5 million. The Foundation will sponsor a provincial symposium on practitioner research and a call for research proposals for 2003 will be issued. The Board approved grants totaling not more than \$85,000 for the coming year. This Foundation received \$7,780 from superannuated teachers in the last mail-out fundraising approach. Many superannuates made donations to the Foundation this spring in memory of Dr. Stirling McDowell. A number of additional approaches will be made to local teacher's associations in the coming year. Appointed to the

Project Review Committee was Darrel Paproski from Wynyard. Len Lorenz from Nipawin, Warren Noonan and Wendy Siemens from Saskatoon were appointed to the Project Review Committee.

Councillors Report

CO-CHAIRS: SHIRLEY DYCK AND DARLENE McCULLOUGH

Provincial Bargaining:

A series of regional meetings for local association presidents, councillors, and staff representatives were held throughout the province on September 3, 4, and 5. These meetings assessed the progress made during the summer through conciliation and direct negotiations. Since that time a tentative agreement has been made and a ratification vote will take place on Sept. 23 and 24.

Councillor Conference and Special Meeting of Council: A Councillor Conference and Special Meeting of Council is planned for Oct. 18 and 19 to be held at the Radisson Hotel in Saskatoon. The format of the Council is intended to provide an opportunity for councillors to focus on some of the larger policy issues during the conference part of the program. Council will move into a formally constituted Special Meeting on the second day to make decisions on policy questions and deal with any resolutions from members.

Annual General Meeting

The 2002 Annual General Meeting was considered a huge success according to the Evaluation Report which was compiled from the 173 evaluations received from delegates. The Planning Committee wishes to thank the delegates for the thought and effort you put into completing the Evaluation Form at the AGM.

We will consider all your comments. We would like to report that the expenditure for the 2002 AGM came in slightly over budget but they were met because we had received corporate sponsorship.

The 2003 AGM will be held in the Travelodge Hotel in Saskatoon on May 21-23.

At their first meeting on Sept. 11, the Planning Committee decided the format for the 2003 AGM will be similar to last year. We are now following up on leads for possible speakers and Interest session Facilitators for this AGM.

Constitution and Resolutions Committee Report

Further to the resolution passed at the last AGM mandating the Executive to undertake a constitution review, the Executive has adopted a tentative framework and a tentative time line. Our hope is that there will be a draft policy handbook containing the constitution, bylaws, policies and executive guidelines and procedures ready to go to the Chapters for your consideration and feedback from mid-January to early March 2003. Therefore, we request that Chapters develop a mechanism - be it the Chapter Executive, a Chapter committee or an individual reporting on behalf of the Chapter - to respond to the draft. Also, if you have ideas of what you would like to see included in the provincial constitution, please forward them to the STS office.

The current constitution, as amended at the last AGM, is being forwarded to all Chapters. Also being forwarded are the format and criteria for resolutions.

Benefits Committee Report

Members of the Benefit Committee met on Wed., Sept. 11, with Darwin Forbes, the Blue Cross representative, present for part of the meeting.

Participation

Participation in the plan continues to grow, slowly but steadily, as new retirees take advantage of the opportunity to join. (See Table)

There is some movement in and out between our plan and the Teacher Plan as members accept temporary teaching contracts.

NOTE: The surviving spouse of any Teacher or Superannuated Teacher will, in most instances, receive a portion of the pension that would have been payable to the member. The spouse is now eligible to become a member of STS and a member of the Benefit Plan, but they must make application to do so. Acceptance into the Plan is

guaranteed if application is made within 60 days of being eligible. After the 60-day open period, a medical form must be submitted and approved.

Claims Experience

The goal of the plan is to have 89% of premiums used for the payment of claims. Eight percent goes to Blue Cross and the remaining 3% is paid to STS to cover our administration costs. From the 89% about 10% is held to cover the payment of claims that have been incurred but not yet submitted by participants in the plan. It is to our advantage to reduce this number, so we encourage members to submit claims on a regular basis rather than hold them all till the end of the year.

For the period of July 1, 2001 to

June 30, 2002 the claims ratio for the Health Plan was 84.5% and 78.5% for the Dental Plan. The Plans are pretty well on target.

Contract Renewal

The current contract with Saskatchewan Blue Cross expires on Dec. 31, 2002. A sub committee, composed of Bert Gordon, Fred Herron and Horst Sawatski, with President Doreen an ex-officio member, has been established to carry on negotiations for a new contract. The first meeting with Blue Cross representatives has been set for September 30.

Some increase in Health Care premiums is probable due to natural inflation and to increases in the cost of prescription drugs. Some new benefits were suggested at the AGM and also by members through other contacts. The committee will examine and price out all such requests and try to come up with a sound level of benefits at the best possible price. As we have mentioned often, we can have whatever benefits we want as long as we are prepared to pay for them.

Term Insurance

Blue Cross has developed insurance plans that could be marketed as STS plans, and we continue to study them. A suggestion came up that we should perhaps look at Long Term Care Insurance but there has been no action as yet.

In summary, our Benefit Insurance Plans are doing well, thanks in large part to the participants who have taken ownership of the Plans and are using them wisely and well. We encourage you to continue to do so. We also encourage others to join. There is strength in numbers.

50th Anniversary Reunion Normal School Class of 1951-52

On June 8th and 9th the Normal School Class of 1951-52 gathered at Wood Acres in Moose Jaw to renew old acquaintances and share memories. There were 69 graduates registered and with spouses brought the total to 118. They hailed from Manitoba, Alberta, British Columbia, many from Saskatchewan, and the furthest being Maxine Paul Pendleton from California..

The reunion was wonderful and so well planned by Hazel Burr Warren, Dolly Simpson Mackin, Jeannette Ball Dow, Bernice Ziehlke Crosbie, Mary Jackson Barber and Marion Dellinger Spagrud.

The food, fellowship and reminiscing were exceptional. We hope to do this again perhaps in five years time.

ACER*/CART Report

FRED HERRON, ACER/CART SASKATCHEWAN REPRESENTATIVE

*Association Canadienne des Enseignantes et des Enseignantes Retraités

The eleventh Annual General Meeting of the Canadian Association of Retired Teachers was held in Ottawa on June 14-15, 2002 with representatives from all thirteen provincial retired teachers' organizations in attendance.

The annual meeting approved a vision statement and a program of activities that includes service to member organizations, and issues relating to retirement income, health, communication, marketing ACER/CART, relationship with CTF, financial and staff resources, and support for excellence in education. The delegates approved the establishment of a permanent position and role description for an Executive Director and retained the services of M. Pierre Drouin on a part-time basis for 2002-2003.

The delegates also approved unanimously a policy on Health Care in Canada. The policy is based on the submission to the Romanow Commission made by ACER/CART in 2001. It provides an excellent basis from which member organizations can advocate for health care for superannuated teachers.

The issue of fees is of major importance to ACER/CART since current fees generate less than \$4,000 annually and the proposed expenditures for 2002-2003 exceed \$32,000. The shortfall is covered through in-kind contributions and accumulated surplus. The in-kind contributions were approximately \$9,500 in 2001-2002 and the accumulated surplus is just over \$26,000. In order to retain some of our accumulated surplus several members made commitments to make ad hoc contributions for the 2002-2003 year. The current fee for Saskatchewan members is approximately five cents per member. In order to generate

sufficient revenue to cover our budgeted expenditures the fee would need to be in excess of 25 cents per member for all members in Canada.

Floyd Sweet of Alberta Retired Teachers' Association was re-elected President, Dr. Terence McKague of STS was re-elected Vice-President and Val Alcock from the Retired Teachers of Ontario was re-elected Executive Member-at-Large.

The reports submitted by the 13 ACER/CART Member organizations are being made available to all STS Executive Members. The 25 page summary is obviously too long for inclusion in *Outreach* but a copy may be obtained by any member by contacting the STS office.

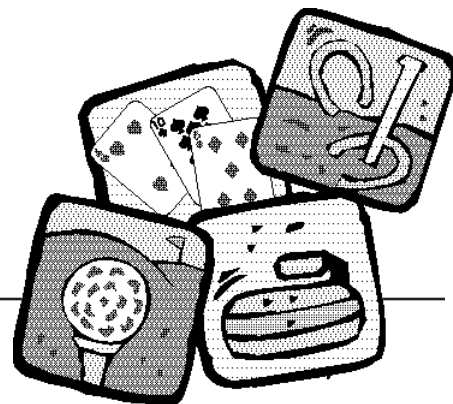

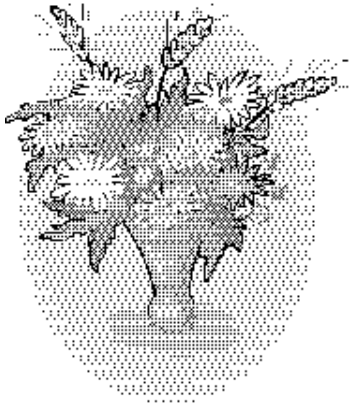
