Advocacy

Discussions at the October 26, 2021, Advocacy Committee Meeting included a focus on five resolutions passed at the May 2021 AGM and referred to the Advocacy Committee. In addition to the information included here, there are periodic updates placed on the STS website under Disposition of Resolutions for all resolutions.

Two resolutions (resolutions A.5 and A.7) requesting that the STS encourage involvement of members in advocacy efforts were referenced in a Presidents' Memo sent out on October 6, 2021. Actions were requested from Presidents whereas the Advocacy Committee and Provincial Executive encouraged Chapters and members to participate in advocacy that supports our active teacher colleagues. October 5 was World Teacher Day and participation in advocacy is one way that retired teachers can participate in recognition of this day and express support for teachers currently in the classroom. Another two resolutions (A.8 and A.9) asking for policy development and a statement opposing ageism, have begun to be addressed by the Committee as we reviewed definitions of ageism, discussion of the STS role in this matter and the start of development of a draft policy on ageism that focuses on an older population. This work will continue and will hopefully be ready for consideration by Delegates to the 2022 AGM.

Annual General Meeting Planning

Budget, Finance and Audit

The current membership of the STS is 11,948, which continues to represent growth in our overall membership.

The audited financial reports for 2020-21, which normally would have been provided in hard copy at the Chapter Presidents' Meeting, were emailed to Chapter Presidents from the office on October 22, 2021. Please contact your Chapter President if you wish to review either a copy of the full reports or the summary that was provided in the context of the email. Alternatively, you can contact the STS Office to request a copy be emailed to you.

At our October Executive meeting, we reviewed the first quarter financial reports.

The STS Operating Fund shows income of \$269,823.33 (above expectations) and expenses of \$152,168.14 (below expectations). While we realize that these trends are impacted by COVID-19, and that there are significant planned expenses that do not appear on a monthly or even quarterly basis, this is still a healthy financial position to be in at this point in the fiscal year.

The Contingency Fund includes term deposits, short term investments, and a market investment account for a combined total as of September 30, 2021, of \$1,648,779.15. Of that amount, \$50,000 has been sent to Saskatchewan Seniors Mechanism (SSM) in support of the Home Supports Initiative, as approved by the STS Provincial Executive.

We reviewed the Extended Health Plan financial statements and are satisfied with the information. The details are found in the Group Benefits report.

Governance and Handbook Review

The Governance and Handbook Review (GAHR) Committee met September 28, October 14 and October 26 via Zoom and continued their work addressing three resolutions passed at the 2021 AGM. Resolution A.17 pertains to the review of all aspects of the Contingency Fund; Resolution E.8 addresses the review of policies and practices for charitable donations; and, Resolution A.10 refers to an extensive survey of membership with a focus on the needs, goals and wishes of members to guide the STS in adapting and emerging from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Request for Feedback – Resolutions A.17 and E.8

The Committee completed background and key questions surrounding Resolutions A.17 and E.8 to engage members in the process. A memo was sent to Chapter Presidents on October 18, 2021, including the background and questions as well as suggesting approaches to gathering feedback. The memo identified November 19 as the deadline for responses to be submitted by email to the STS office. The GAHR Committee appreciates the efforts of Chapter Presidents and membership in providing feedback around these issues. We thank you in advance for your participation and look forward to your responses.

The plan moving forward is for a sub-committee to review feedback on November 23 and to share findings with the Committee at a December 7 Zoom meeting. The hope is to have a report prepared for the January 2022 Executive meeting.

Survey Plan in Progress – Resolution A.10

Regarding Resolution A.10, the Committee is preparing possible survey items addressing goals, needs and wishes as indicated in the resolution. At our October 26 meeting the Committee recommended that the Executive engage a professional survey company called Praxis to conduct a survey of our membership. A motion to that effect was passed at the October 27 Executive Meeting. Details regarding the timeline for further developing and administering the survey will follow as the work with Praxis moves forward.

Again, thank you to our Chapter Presidents and members for engaging in the feedback request, and thank you to the GAHR Committee members for lending their time and expertise to the ongoing governance review process.

The STS Office will be closed for the holidays at noon on December 17 and will reopen January 4, 2022. From the Staff at the Superannuated Teachers of Saskatchewan, we wish you a Happy Holiday and a New Year filled with prosperity and joy!

Group Benefits

The Group Benefits Committee met with Mark Mireault, Head of Strategic Relationships with Saskatchewan Blue Cross. Experience reports were reviewed for both the Extended Health and Dental Plan.

After three months of the fourth year of the agreement, the Health Plan revenues were \$2,759,450.65, paid claims were \$2,185,598.07 and administration costs were \$109,279.90 resulting in a surplus of \$464,572.68.

After three months of the fourth year of the agreement, the Dental Plan revenues were \$1,647,570.65; paid claims were \$1,414,782.23; and, the administration costs were \$67,202.16 resulting in a surplus of \$165,586.26.

We are currently in the fourth year of the agreement with Saskatchewan Blue Cross and are still showing a surplus, which is an anomaly. We believe this is largely attributable to COVID-19 and members not accessing services as frequently as prior to COVID-19.

Membership in the Plan is 8,586 which is an increase of 228 from a year ago.

As most of you are aware, this is a negotiating year for our Plan. We have engaged a professional consultant to assist with the negotiation of an agreement renewal as well as to assist with oversight for the Plan. We believe this will help to ensure all opportunities for enhanced coverage and reduced expenses are explored in the new agreement, for the benefit of members.

The Plan continues to be in a sound financial position. The Committee will continue to provide oversight of the Group Benefits Plan.

Honorary Life Membership

The Honorary Life Membership Committee met on October 26, 2021. Resolutions

Ongoing work on the Disposition of Resolutions from the 2021 Annual General Meeting was reviewed. A document including updates to the disposition is available on the STS website. Discussion occurred regarding whether the Resolutions Committee might take a more direct role in possibly chairing the resolutions portion of the Annual General Meeting. Guidelines within the STS Policy Handbook would likely need to be updated.

Two potential resolutions for 2022 STF Annual Meeting of Council were discussed. The two resolutions approved in principle are regarding the composition of the STF Pension and Benefits Board as well as the indexing of Teachers' Superannuation Plan pensions.

Chapters are encouraged to begin thinking about resolutions they may wish to submit to the 2022 STS Annual General Meeting.



COVID-19 and Travel – Q&A with Saskatchewan Blue Cross

Are COVID-19 tests covered by the STS Extended Health Plan or the Health Spending Account (HSA)?

Expenses for a COVID-19 test are not eligible under the insured benefits. These expenses are only eligible under the Canada Revenue Agency medical expense tax credit (METC) if prescribed by a medical practitioner. Government, employer or business requirements are not considered a 'prescription' by CRA and therefore expenses incurred for testing as a result of air travel, government regulation, or business or employer requirements are not eligible under HSA. Likewise, the purchase of rapid test kits, should a member want these on hand for personal use, would not be eligible under HSA.

If someone is travelling out of country and tests positive, are quarantine costs for hotel and/or any other costs associated with changing one's travel plans covered by the Plan?

There is Plan coverage for extra costs of commercial accommodations and meals resulting from a delayed return trip due to a sudden and unforeseen illness or accident requiring immediate treatment. Under the STS plan, this includes the following:

Meals and Accommodation: Additional board, lodging or similar expenses incurred by the Participant and any travelling companion(s) when the return trip is delayed due to the Participant's hospitalization, to a combined daily limit of \$150 for no more than 10 days. This must be verified by the attending Physician and supported with receipts from commercial organizations.

Therefore, if you have been placed in quarantine beyond your planned return date due to a positive COVID-19 screening test for air travel or government regulation, coverage for meals and accommodations is not available. However, if your return trip is delayed due to hospitalization as a result of COVID-19, coverage for meals and accommodations is available. The plan does not provide coverage for trip interruption benefits and therefore any expenses incurred for new airfare or changes to existing airfare are not covered by the plan.

Saskatchewan Blue Cross will automatically extend the travel insurance coverage free of charge until 72 hours after the end of the quarantine or until the member is able to return to their province of residence, whichever comes first. We define a quarantine as being the isolation, for a determined period, of a sick or potentially infected individual to limit the transmission of a contagious disease.

To be considered "in quarantine" you must therefore be:

Potentially infected or infected with COVID-19.

• Placed in isolation for a period determined by the health authorities (often 14 days) in order to protect the health of the population.

Does our Plan have coverage for any COVID-19 complications arising if a member chooses to travel to or from a COVID-19 "hot zone" or restricted travel destination?

The Outside Province of Residence Travel Benefits under the STS plan does not include an exclusion in relation to travel advisories, and so STS plan members are protected against medical expenses for COVID-19 while travelling within Canada and internationally. With that said, we strongly recommend adherence to the advice of the Government of Canada. If a member contracts COVID-19 while travelling, the travel benefits will offer coverage provided they have not tested positive for COVID-19 or shown symptoms of the virus in the 90 days prior to departure (pre-existing condition). It is important to note that given the magnitude of the world-wide crisis, the reduced availability of medical resources around the world, and the measures taken by different countries to limit the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic, our assistance service may be limited in its ability to assist people in emergency situations abroad.

ACER-CART

Time for a National Seniors Plan

The Association of Canadian Retired Teachers (ACER-CART) has a current priority to advocate for the development and implementation of a National Seniors Strategy.

Older adults are the fastest growing segment of the Canadian population. Currently 15% of our population is aged 65 and older, and that number is expected to increase to 25% by 2056.

A comprehensive National Seniors Strategy with clear expectations and targeted funding has been put forth by the NIA (National Institute on Ageing). That proposal will guarantee basic rights for Canada's older population and ensure that their needs will be met.

Four pillars have been identified that would structure a National Seniors Strategy.

Pillar 1: Empower Independent, Productive and Engaged Older Canadians by addressing:

- ageism, elder abuse, and social isolation
- · access to affordable housing
- · improving income security for seniors
- the creation of age-friendly communities, physical environments, and spaces
- access to inclusive transportation

Pillar 2: Support Healthy and Active Lives as long as possible for Older Canadians by ensuring:

- support for engagement in Wellness and Prevention Activities that will enable Healthy Ageing
- access to Medically Necessary and appropriate Medications and Vaccines
- older Canadians and their caregivers are assisted to participate in informed Health Decision-Making & Advance Care Planning

Pillar 3: Provide Care Close to Home to deliver person-centered, high quality, integrated care as close to home as possible by care providers who have the knowledge and skills to care for Older Canadians by ensuring:

- access to appropriate, high quality Long-Term Care, Palliative, and End-of Life services
- older Canadians have access to care providers who are trained to specifically provide the care needed.
- standardized metrics and accountability standards to enable a National Seniors Strategy

• the Needs of Older Adults are recognized and supported in Emergency and Disaster Preparedness Planning, Response, and Recovery Efforts.

Pillar 4: Support for Care Givers that acknowledges and supports the family and friends of older Canadians who provide unpaid care for their loved ones by ensuring:

- unpaid caregivers and older adults are supported in the workplace
- unpaid caregivers are not unnecessarily penalized financially for taking on caregiving roles

Different levels of government have different responsibilities; however, ACER-CART is calling on all levels of government to work together to achieve these goals. A National Seniors Strategy needs to be created and activated as soon as possible to ensure appropriate care for our older population.
